A Bit of History

Old Newspaper report 1876

Harry Thompson, a carpenter, was charged with being drunk and assaulting police constable Screen. The prisoner said he joined a new club on Wednesday night, and he and the members had a large quantity of drink there. The club was held in a large public house in the Ledbury Road, Nr Bridge, looking at a card handed up by the prisoner, said the name of the club was "The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes" he told the prisoner that the present time was past the deluge, and advised him "not to go back to the Antediluvian! Period". He committed him to prison for 14 days.

I wonder if he was the first drunk buff or if he ever did go back.

(This story is not, "I have been assured" about Bro Harry Thompson ROH of the Midland lodge it's just a coincidence the article on their tie appearing opposite)

ORIGIN OF THE MIDLAND LODGE TIE

History records that at the time the Domesday Book was written, the Manor of Hemel Hempstead was already divided between two men. The Manor which the Monks of St Albans had at Redbourne also had lands in Hemel Hempstead - The Kings Langley Manor of Bulystrodes owned land in Bovingdon.

Hugo Fitz Otto's Manor of Latimers stretched across into Flaunden, with sub manors of Westbrook Hay and Little Gaddesden.

Edward Miller (Associated to the kings Court) described the estates of the Abbey of St Albans as being outside the orthodox Midland Manorial Structure and said the same of Hemel Hempstead (This from court records of 1269 A.D).

The Midland Manorial Structure consisted of Freeman's Holdings, within, but, separate from the Manor of Hemel Hempstead and this prevailed until the year 1898 when all manors in the area were absorbed into the Hemel Hempstead Manor and became the borough of Hemel Hempstead. It is interesting to note that most people in the town were above the rank of labourer, but, below the rank of gentleman.

The Midland is not mentioned again until 1877 when the Midland Railway was opened - there was quite a political struggle as to where this railway should terminate, but, that is another story. However, it is from that story that the way of life at the time in this area is related here. While agriculture was the sole employment for men, records show that women and girls could make more money plaiting straw and making hats, dolls etc. Even children after six weeks training could earn as much as 8 to 14 shillings a week. (Training started at the age of 4 years). From market records in 1860, it was recorded that as much as £200.00 had been turned in the sale of straw hats alone in a single day.

It is this part of our history which has promoted the designed of the motif for the Midland Lodge Tie. We hope you find it of interest if asked why the design, you can answer in con-

10 Questions

1 Who are the Buffaloes? The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes (Buffs) is an ancient order, dedicated to Truth, Justice and Philanthropy

2 Who can join? Any male over the age of 18 may join the Order

3 Is it expensive? The Order is as expensive as you want it to be. The bare minimum you have to pay is your registration fee (usually around £1 per week). There are then additional collections for benevolent funds, appeals and other funds, which are all voluntary.

4 Would I be expected to go out collecting money in tins? We are not a charity, and therefore it is illegal for our members to go out on the streets with collection tins. The usual methods for collecting donations from the public is through sponsored events

5 What is a lodge? A Lodge can mean a number of things: It can be the name of the local group, the actual meeting itself, or even the room in which the meeting takes place

6 Does it matter what religion I am? The Order offers nothing that is against any moral or religious laws, and we do not discriminate based upon religion

7 Does it matter if I belong to any other similar organizations? There is nothing stopping you from joining this Order if you are already a member of another similar organisation (such as the Masons) - in fact, a number of our members are members of more than one organisation

8 Can ladies join? As the RAOB is a male-only organisation, there is no provision for women to join. However, there is a section of the Order called the "Ladies Glades", which is the female equivalent of the RAOB, and is traditionally joined by the partners of members of the Order

9 Does it matter if I'm shy? Not at all! As the meetings are a "closed community", you will find that it doesn't matter if you make a fool of yourself - only the other Brethren in your Lodge will see

10 How can I join? To join the Order you have to be proposed by a member that knows you, but if you don't already know any members the best idea is to have a chat with the brothers before they go up to their lodge. If you don't know where they meet get in touch with the Editor of this journal and I will do my best to find a lodge near you.

My return to the Order.

I joined the order in April 1976 at the Amos Clamp Lodge 8093 at the old age of 24, I was in the RAF at Finningley and lived in the local village of Askern where I shared a flat with a colleague who also joined the order with me. We had great times there and made many good friends sadly whom I have now lost contact with. I felt the Order was like a second family to me being so far from home and the City Sec's (landlord) wife was always looking after us with homemade pies and stews. It was a great 18months then we both got demobbed and went our separate ways. On my return to Reading I became Affiliated to the Burghfield Lodge 9094 held at the Horncastle PH. My life in the Order continued and was raised to the 2nd degree in January 78. For 3 years I enjoyed the comforts of my new lodge and attended many raisings and visitations, I really enjoyed visiting other lodges where things were different but the same. The Article in the August edition has stirred up some old memories.

I have heard a story from one of our brothers that back in 1981, the brothers of the Jubilee Lodge, (now defunct) Grand Executive Banner

Held an open day in one of the Local schools in Hornsey, near to where they held their Lodge meetings at the Nightingale Pub, to raise money for the Dungeness Lifeboat Appeal.

Some of the brothers involved were names that some of you may know, were Bro. Les Blunt ROH, Bro. Bill Wilkinson KOM, Bro. John Hillier KOM, Bro. Brian Hillier KOM, Bro. Alfie Foames ROH, Bro. Joe Levy ROH, Bro. David Levy ROH, and Bro. Chris Barker CP. The grand Primo of the GEB at the time was, I think, Bro. Liam Hartigan ROH, and he was in attendance.

Edd note "That Bro Harry Thompson keeps crapping up"

An introduction to Buffaloism as practiced by the R.A.O.B.

There are a number of sections or "banners" of the R.A.O.B., and while they differ in numerical strength and procedures, all have the same purpose, often freely and aptly described as "the pursuit of Brotherhood".

Our conception of Brotherhood is firmly based on the family principle, that the total power and strength of the family shall be available to the individual in accordance with his need, but the point must be made at once, that the degree to which needs can be met depends entirely on the loyalty to that principle of each member of the family, YOU and I.

Administratively we are a three-tier organization. Minor Lodge, Provincial Grand Lodge and Grand Lodge and there are four degrees or rank of membership. 1st (Brother), 2nd (Primo), 3rd (Knight of Merit) and 4th (Right Honorable).

As any attempt to give a detailed explanation of the working of the P.G.L. or G.L. or to describe the method of promotion to higher degree would, at this stage, be more likely to confuse than inform. I will leave that subject with the assurance that administrative office and higher degree are the prerogative of every Brother who aspires to them and who, by the quality of his service, is shown to deserve them.

The first, and possibly the most important fact, is that there are no contractual or insurance elements attached to membership of the Order. Grants from benevolent funds at any level, are not related to what you give but to what you need, and exactly the same principle applies to the services we give in our Convalescent Homes.

We really believe in the joy and satisfaction to be found in sharing the burden of our associates, and in helping them to solve the many human problems to which mankind is heir. The chain of goodwill, forged in this attitude of a regard for others, is strong enough to reach and hold each of us if we have submitted to the natural instinct of mankind to "assist those of the Brotherhood in difficulty or in need".

Before going on to an explanation of the various things to which we apply this gospel of good fellowship, it seems to me to be a good place to advise a searcher after the truth, who has absorbed this rather tentative and possibly inadequate picture of the spirit in which we work; if, in the reading he finds himself on unfamiliar ground, with no touch of responsive warmth in his heart; it might be as well for him and for us if he gives up the vision of hidden bonanzas in buffaloism; there is nothing in it of what the commercial mind would call "PROFIT".

So, if you are still with me. I will proceed to illustrate for your better understanding some of the machinery of buffaloism.

Membership of a Lodge of the Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes is open to all adult males without distinction as to social position, religious faiths or political beliefs. Before a candidate is accepted, he has to convince the members of the Lodge in which his application is made that he is a loyal citizen and that he is genuinely desirous of taking part in our work. On the basis of giving to the extent of his power, in cash or in service, whatever is required to meet the needs of a less fortunate Brother or the dependant widow and children of a deceased Brother.
